


ABOUT SUMNER HALL

Built circa 1908, Sumner Hall is one of two African American Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.) veterans' halls still standing in the United States. After years of disrepair, it reopened in 2014 as a museum, educational venue, performance stage, and community center. Sumner Hall's mission is to preserve itself as a place of remembrance of African Americans who served in the U.S. Civil War by (I) honoring all African American veterans of the U.S. armed services; (2) promoting an understanding of the African American experience within the overall context of American history and culture; and (3) advocating for social justice and racial equity in all aspects of civic life. Sumner Hall is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.


ABOUT THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF KENT COUNTY






Legacy Day 2021 profiled 44 outstanding African American athletes of Kent County and four outstanding coaches. Thirteen of the honored athletes and two of the coaches are women.

Twenty-six of these athletes were triple-threats and 11 were inducted into the Kent County High and 11 were inducted into the Kent County High of Fame. Twelve were scholar-athletes meaning they maintained a grade point average of at least 3.25, and 20 went on to graduate from college. Virtually all affirmed that sports competitive sports. The profiled athletes and consches (and the sports they played or coached) are listed below in the chronological order of their are listed below in the chronological order of their high school graduation.

Garnet High School and Kent County High School provided the main opportunities for African American athletes to develop and display their talents. All-black community baseball teams played in small towns and villages throughout Kent and Queen Anne's counties from the produce three stars who played professional produce three stars who played professional baseball. Competitive sports have long played an important role in African American life. In a society that has suppressed black aspirations, team sports provided a chance to compete, and often excel, on a relatively level playing field. Organized sports provided an opportunity to strengthen community ties while taking pride in the achievements of great players and coaches. Athletic competition helped to develop the qualities of sportsmanship, discipline, hard work, and leadership that fostered success in life after shorts. For some, athletic skill provided a way out of the poverty and limited opportunities out of the poverty and limited opportunities

Legacy Day started in 2014 as an effort to celebrate the rich cultural heritage of African Americans in Kent County. Honorees have included African American musicians, businesses, educators, and churches. Legacy Day 2021 honored African American athletes and coaches who excelled in team sports. At least one who excelled in team sports. At least one played in Kent County high schools except golf.




